Deen from the air, CHARLESTON—surrounded by long, slender islands and miles of undulating coastline, appears rather unassuming. Apart from the Arthur Ravenel Jr. Bridge, with its soaring spires and cables as thick as telephone poles, it is a low-lying city. In the absence of modern skyscrapers, a handful of centuries-old church steeples punctuate the skyline, and a dense canopy of trees conceals many of the city's oldest buildings.

Charleston was never intended to be seen from the air. Suspended in a stratum of enchantment that measures no higher than four-stories above the sidewalk, the city is one of the most compactly magical and seductive places on the planet.

CHECKING IN

If you've ever wondered
what it's like to stay in one
of Charleston's exquisite
private residences, check into
a Governor's Suite at Planters
Inn. With soaring ceilings,
classic architectural elements,
and a fireplace, this two-room
jewel-box is the mirror image of
a local mansion.

In fact, once you step inside this 19th-century luxury-goods-emporium-turned-boutique-hotel, you'll feel like you've been transported to another era. Planters Inn was originally built in 1844 and today houses 64 elegantly-appointed guest rooms, each individually-decorated with a tasteful mix of antiques and Baker Historic Charleston Collection furnishings.

Start the day with a leisurely spin past resplendent the mansions surrounding the hotel. Thanks to the Grand Modell of 1680, a sophisticated urban development plan that established easy-to-navigate streets, wander freely without the fear of getting lost.



Home to some of the country's oldest gardens, Charleston is a botanical wonderland, and there's a special secret garden hidden in the Historic District. In 1942, Mrs. Emily Whaley enlisted landscape architect Loutrel W. Briggs to design a garden for her mid 18th century home. Together, they created a tranquil oasis as chronicled in the book Mrs. Whaley and Her Charleston Garden.
